


Sheikh Ahmed Hussein Dabash Samir al- Batawi Captured

- Sheikh Ahmed Hussein Dabash Samir al- Batawi, aka Ahmed al-Dabash, a key insurgent leader in Iraq was captured by Iraqi and Coalition forces in the Ameriya neighborhood in the Mansour district of Baghdad May 29.
- Ahmed al-Dabash was a major financier and facilitator of terrorism in Iraq, most notably the bomb attack in the Shiite holy city of Karbala on March 2, 2004.
- More than 140 Iraqis were murdered and hundreds wounded in the attack that occurred during the Shiite observance of Ashoura, a time when thousands of pilgrims gathered in Karbala.



TIMELINE: May 27-29, 2006


May 27: Coalition forces verified and destroyed a weapons cache based on reporting from earlier in the day May 27th.


May 28: Coalition forces located 5 terrorists tied to the original emplacement of the cache. The terrorists attempted to emplace IED material in the vicinity of Ramadi. The Coalition air strike killed 2 terrorists and injured 3 while in the act of planting the IED.

May 29: These operations led Coalition forces to several more operations on Monday that resulted in the detention of 12 terrorists and the destruction of one munitions cache and explosive material; more than 20 120 mm and 10 100 mm mortar rounds.

SIGNIFICANCE:

Discovery and destruction denies use of weapons against Iraqis or Iraqi and Coalition forces.





MISSION: Coalition forces conducted an assault to capture or kill foreign fighter facilitators in the Lake Thar Thar area.



ACTIONS:

4 terrorists killed (2 Saudi, 2 unknown) 2 detainees (Sudanese, Iraqi)


SIGNIFICANCE:

Disrupted foreign terrorist facilitation and likely prevented suicide bombings launching into Baghdad.

One detainee was Sudanese, one Iraqi Tunisian, Saudi, Yemeni, Turkish, Iraqi passports were seized




Iraqi Army Operations in Ubaydah to End Sectarian Violence

- •May 24, 2006
- •About 500 Iraqi soldiers from 2nd Battalion, 2nd Brigade, 8th Iraqi Army Division, supported by Coalition Army and Air forces and over 100 Iraqi Police Forces led by Babil Provincial Chief GEN Qais.
- •Raid in the Ubaydah region of Southern Lutafiyah in response to reports of kidnappings, and increased sectarian violence in the area.
- •Iraqi planned and led operation based on intelligence developed in collaboration between various Iraqi army and police units.
- •Operation resulted in the death or capture of several known terrorists and the capture of enemy weapons to include mortars and an antiaircraft gun.









Wathba Water Treatment Plant - Baghdad Province



Scope: Project involves rehabilitating the electrical and electrical and mechanical components of the two existing water treatment plants. Rehabilitation requirements are expected to enhance the treatment plants to their operating capacity of 2,000 cubic meters of water each day. About 650,000 residents of Baghdad will benefit from cleaner water.







Al-Nasser Electrical Substation - Manshad, Dhi Qar Province




Scope: This project involves installation of two new transformers, additional circuit breakers, switchgear, and ancillary equipment. Work on the site includes all civil, mechanical, and electrical construction work required for a complete substation.



This project brings Dhi Qar province closer to its goal of connecting approximately 50,000 citizens to the national power grid to supply all areas with a reliable electrical supply. This project will help provide critical power to heat water for cooking, bathing and washing as well as sustained power for lighting, refrigeration and air conditioning for Al Nasser residents during the hot summer months.
