Mission

On March 27, NATO decided to take control over all military operations for Libya under United Nations Security Council Resolutions 1970 & 1973. The aim of Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR is to protect civilians and civilian-populated areas under attack or threat of attack.

The mission consists of three elements: an arms embargo, a no-fly-zone and actions to protect civilians from attack or the threat of attack.

Over the past 24 hours, NATO has conducted the following activities associated with Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR:

Air Operations

Since the beginning of the NATO operation (31 March 2011, 08.00GMT) a total of **1567** sorties and **643** strike sorties* have been conducted.

Sorties conducted 9 April: 133

Strike sorties conducted 9 April: 56

*Strike sorties are intended to identify and engage appropriate targets, but do not necessarily deploy munitions each time.

Arms Embargo Activities

A total of **18** ships under NATO command are actively patrolling the Central Mediterranean. **33** Vessels were hailed on **9** April to determine destination and cargo. No boardings were conducted. A total of **209** vessels have been hailed and **5** boardings have been conducted since the beginning of arms embargo operations.

Traffic Control Humanitarian Assistance

Total of Humanitarian Movements**: **39** (air, ground, maritime) Ships delivering Humanitarian Assistance 9 April: **5** Aircraft delivering Humanitarian Assistance 9 April: **2**

Command and Control

NATO's operational commander for Operation Unified Protector is **Lieutenant-General Charles Bouchard** of the Canadian Air Force. His office and staff is located at the Joint Force Command in Naples.
